That's why the BC Construction Association (BCCA) has chosen to honour four public owners who consistently show leadership in the procurement of construction services.

"Construction-specific procurement may seem like a niche topic, but the procurement process is essential to ensuring that a public project doesn't suffer from escalating costs, expanded timelines, and compromised outcomes," says Chris Atchison, President of BCCA. "Taxpayers can't afford faulty practises, and neither can contractors. These awards recognize that there are some public sector entities that are trying to get it right."
